



Go! Global Fair in Nagasaki

On Saturday, December 12th, 277 Year 10 students participated in “Go! Global Fair 2015 in Nagasaki” at Nagasaki University Faculty of Economics. At the event, Mr. Masami Watanabe from the Ministry of Education encouraged the participants to gain a global perspective through studying abroad. Mr. Tetsuya Yasukochi, a well-known teacher of English, gave the attendees some quizzes about what advantages studying abroad would give us. The highlight of the event was the recitation by all the people present of the famous words by the late Steve Jobs:

The only way to do great work is to love what you do.
If you haven't found it yet, keep looking. Don't settle.

Many students had a great time, finding everything there being presented in exactly the same way they learn English in Nagasaki Higashi.



In the afternoon, there were some presentations by the university and Nagasaki Higashi students who did study abroad. Miss Nanami Baba (Class 2-7) and Miss Fumika Sakurama (Class 1-4), both from TOBI-TATE! Young Ambassador Program hosted by the Ministry of Education, were among the presenters. Miss Baba showed her voluntary work at an orphanage in Vietnam and research at Nagasaki University Institute of Tropical Medicine Vietnam Research Station. Miss Sakurama presented her experience in New Zealand, where she learned about the tradition of Maori culture and interacted with the students from other countries.

Also, other valuable information about schools outside Japan was available at the booths by some embassies, the overseas organizations of Japanese government and the Eiken Foundation of Japan. Many students visited these booths, trying to find out what they could do in the future.
